Rutgers students are invited to apply for the Young Leaders Summit: Becoming a Global Health Entrepreneur taking place on April 21st at Stony Brook University in New York. The summit will feature workshops led by social entrepreneurs who have been at the forefront of the global fight against AIDS and malaria. The workshops will focus both on innovative opportunities to do field work in global health and entrepreneurial approaches to building community-based campaigns to support the global fight against AIDS and malaria. The summit's keynote speaker is Joelle Tanguy, the Managing Director of the Global Business Coalition on HIV/AIDS. 11. TROPICAL FIELD BIOLOGY IN PUERTO RICO

Rutgers Summer Session is offering an intensive two-week tropical biology field course in Puerto Rico. Emphasis of study will be on principles of ecology and diversity of organisms. The format of the course will be extensive field trips observing various habitats: tropical rain forest, desert, Mangrove swamp, Karst Topography, coral reef and commercial plantations. Sleeping facilities are at the biology field station of University of Puerto Rico – Mayaguez; they are primitive but comfortable. Ground travel will be by van. Food will be purchased on the road. The course is limited to twelve students. Biology background, career interests and college year will be considered in giving a student preference. Because of the rigorous outdoor activity required for the course, students must be in good physical condition. The fee for the course is \$975 plus tuition.
